SCHOOL UNIFORM

Introduction

The position regarding school uniform is underpinned by the statement in the Department of Education and Science Circular No 7/87 (para 5.9.2) which states:

"The question of whether school uniform is worn is... one which, in the Secretary of State's view, contributes significantly to the ethos of the school and should hence be decided by the governing body."

In giving their strong support to the principle of school uniform over the years the Governors have done so in the belief that they have been reflecting the wishes of an overwhelming majority of the school's parent body.

OUTDOOR CLOTHING - BOYS AND GIRLS

Outdoor clothing should tone with the range of shades of school uniform - blue, grey or black

Raincoats, anoraks, duffle coats and cagoules are all acceptable, but fashion clothes and military-style combat clothing should not be worn. This includes denim and leather clothing as well as clothing heavily decorated with insignia.

If worn, a school scarf is strongly recommended, although a plain scarf in a dark colour is permitted.

Fashion scarves, or football scarves, are not permitted since they are out of character with school uniform.

No headwear should be worn, other than a hood attached to a coat.

All the prices quoted above are approximate and only intended as a guide to costs.

Most items of school uniform can be purchased from a wide variety of retailers; however, the school tie and badge are available only from the official suppliers, Buxton and Bonnett Ltd The Precinct Lichfield or, as available, from the School Shop.

HAIR STYLES AND JEWELLERY

- ❑ Since hair styles can affect the overall smart appearance which a school uniform is intended to create, extreme fashion styles should be avoided.
- ❑ Jewellery is not permitted in school, with the exception of an inexpensive watch, ring and, for girls only, plain earrings or sleepers.

We are delighted to say that during 2002 the school achieved the Sportsmark Award.

Games provision time-wise will be on average 1 x 50 minute period per week. The other 50 minute lesson is given over to other aspects of the PE curriculum. We also spend up to 10 hours per week on extra-curricular games activities (including weekends).

SCHOOL PRODUCTIONS

One of the strong features of our school is the range of productions that take place and which involve so many students.

The Music and Art departments (with important support from many other members of staff) combine to produce an annual musical. This is one of the highlights of the school year. Productions over the last year have included "Annie", "Anything Goes", "Crazy for You" and "Guys and Dolls".

Theatre Studies is one of our Advanced Level subjects and, each year, the Year 13 and Year 12 groups produce plays arising from their studies. We also have productions which are performed entirely by the younger students in the school. Recent ones were "The Hobbit", "Bugsy Malone" and our current project is "Dracula Spectacular".

We also make important and regular contributions to the Lichfield Arts Festival. A 'Sixth Form Revue' is held annually for parents and Sixth Form. This combines a number of high quality performances and a range of "fun" items which are also well composed. House Drama competitions also take place annually and a Dance Club combined with students from Saxon Hill has also been established.

SCHOOL VISITS AND OTHER ACTIVITIES

We provide a wide variety of opportunities for visits to support learning but always try to balance these with the study needs of all subjects for our students. Precise details of activities do vary from year to year and some of the opportunities involve residential stays.

For example, in the year 2004-2005 there were:-

- Visit to the Battlefields of France and Belgium involving some Year 10 history students.
- Field Course opportunities for students involved in the Advanced study of Geography.
- Skiing Trip during February half-term to France.
- Duke of Edinburgh expeditions.
- Sixth Form "Arts" and "Universities Award" visit to Paris.
- Visit to Germany for students involved in the advanced study of German.

In addition to these there are regular school visits to theatres and to more local venues involving many subject departments. Sixth Form activities included "Young Enterprise" in association with local industry and supported by businesses. There is a lot going on. We intend to keep providing as many opportunities as we can reasonably manage.

The Local Education Authority is responsible for admissions to the school and offers places on the basis of vacancies declared. The current arrangements are as follows:-

SEPTEMBER 2006

ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS FOR SECONDARY SCHOOLS

There are no plans to amend the general admission arrangements, including the use of catchment areas, for the 2005/2006 academic year. The school's Published Admission Number (PAN) is 210.

The following order of priority will be used by the Authority to fill the available places:

- a) Pupils whose statutory statement of special need names the preferred school as the most appropriate mainstream school that meets the pupil's needs;
- b) Pupils living within the catchment area of the school;
- c) Pupils who have an elder sibling in attendance at the school and who will still be attending the school at the proposed admission date; (for admission purposes, a sibling is a child who lives at the same address and who is the brother/sister (children who share one common parent), or step brother/step sister where two children are related by marriage. This definition also includes adopted or fostered children living at the same address.)
- d) King Edward VI School does not have a category to give priority to pupils who pursue their primary education at certain schools.
- e) Pupils who satisfy both of the following tests:
 - Test 1: they are distinguished from the great majority of other applicants on medical grounds or by other exceptional circumstances.
Medical grounds must be supported by a medical report (obtained by the parents). It must clearly justify, for health reasons only, why it is better for the child to attend the preferred school rather than any other school.

Exceptional circumstances must relate to the choice of school, i.e. the circumstances of the child, not the economic or social circumstances of the parent. They should be supported by a professional report, e.g. social worker, justifying why it is better for the child to attend the preferred school rather than any other school.

Test 2: they would suffer hardship if they were unable to attend the school.

- f) Other pupils arranged in order of priority according to how near their home addresses are to the school by the shortest walking route as measured by Geographical Information Systems.

Looked After Children falling into any of the categories (b) – (f) above will be given first priority for places within that category.

Where it is not possible to accommodate all pupils within a particular group, the Education Service will allocate the available places in accordance with the remaining criteria, e.g. if there are insufficient places for all catchment area pupils, places will be offered to those who live in the catchment area and also satisfy criteria (c) and so on.

All applications are considered against these published criteria, with no priority awarded for early applications.

Admission to the Sixth Form

There are currently 294 students in the Sixth Form, 139 in the Lower Sixth (Year 12) and 155 in the Upper Sixth (Year 13).

Each year we admit at 16+ about ten students from other schools in cases where we expect to have available spaces on our courses. We welcome direct contact from parents or students seeking information.

The school offers a wide range of Advanced Courses, including Advanced Vocational Awards. In Year 12 students study for “AS” qualifications and in Year 13 they study “A2” qualifications – the combination of the two forming the full “Advanced Level”. There is also an Intermediate level option which runs in conjunction with Tamworth and Lichfield College. Admission to the Sixth Form is conditional on satisfying the qualifications necessary for the courses concerned, plus a good track record regarding the study habits likely to bring success at that level. A separate Sixth Form Information Booklet is available.

GOVERNORS' POLICIES

There is a list of Governors' Policy Statements in Appendix A of the main school Prospectus.

Amongst the policies established by the school are the following.

1. Policy on Charging for School Activities: (together with a statement on remission of charges)

1.1 This policy determines the extent to which charging is permitted within the context of:

- a) the 1944 Education Act, which laid down the principle of free secondary education (Section 61), and
- b) the 1988 Education Act which permitted schools to:
 - i) charge for activities in certain specified circumstances, and
 - ii) invite "voluntary contributions" in others.

1.2 DfES Circular 2/89 purported "to explain and provide guidance" on the provisions of the 1988 Act in respect of charging. The following policy statement and guidelines are based upon the Circular and provide the basis for practice in this school.

2. **The Policy**

2.1 Whereas it is accepted that all pupils have a right to a free secondary education according to the principles laid down by the 1944 Education Act, the School Governors recognise:

- a) the delegated budget is insufficient to meet the demands made upon it if the quality of educational provision is to be maintained, and
- b) teachers have long judged it beneficial to pupils to provide opportunities for school visits and to offer other forms of educational enrichment.

2.2 The Governors therefore determine:

- a) the right of the school to levy charges within the guidelines laid down by legislation;
- b) the right of the school to seek voluntary contributions for school activities in approved circumstances;
- c) that there should be arrangements to remit charges (and, by implication, not to seek voluntary contributions) to the full extent, in order to ensure that no pupil is prevented from participating in an activity offered to other pupils in the teaching group on account of his/her parents' inability to contribute;
- d) that this policy should be kept under review, and
- e) that parents should be made aware of this policy.

3. **The School's Catchment Area**

The catchment area for this school encompasses parts of the centre of Lichfield, South Lichfield as well as the villages of Shenstone, Whittington and parts of Little Aston. Precise details of particular catchment area boundaries can be very intricate, so clarification on specific addresses should always be sought from the Secondary Allocations Department at Staffordshire County Council. The telephone number is: 01785 223121.

4. **Making a formal complaint**

If it has not been possible to resolve a difficulty informally then you can ask to use the formal complaints procedure. Details of this procedure and our Complaints Policy can be obtained from the Headteacher, the Headteacher's Secretary or either of the school's offices.

5. **Acts of Worship**

Parents are reminded of their right to withdraw their children from acts of worship. We have facilities for students not attending assembly to complete separate work elsewhere.

6. **Public Examinations**

It is clear school policy to enter students for the appropriate public examinations relating to the courses of study that they are following. Students all know that they will be taking the examinations and it is very unusual for students not to be entered. In rare cases where students do not take a particular examination, this decision is taken by the school in full consultation with parents and the student.

7. **Sex Education**

In Key Stage 3 Sex Education is delivered by our specialist Health Education Co-ordinator, Mrs Thurlow, to all Year 9 students. The four week module contains work on relationships, sexual intercourse, sexually transmitted infections and contraception (combined pill and condom). In addition the value of the emergency contraceptive pill is examined.

In Key Stage 4 Sex Education is part of Health Education. This is delivered by specialist Biology teachers. Further work on the earlier topics is provided at this stage, including a wider understanding of contraception.

By including sex education within the broader scope of Health Education and understanding about relationships, this helps to place the topic in a wider context.
